


The telephone allowed people to tell their stories using a new technology. Write that here: _____.</p> <p>Last, summarize the article, either orally or in writing.</p>	<p>Indefinite articles <i>a</i> and <i>an</i> are used to refer to a singular noun. <i>A</i> is used with words that begin with a consonant sound. <i>An</i> is used with word that begin with a vowel sound. <u>Examples:</u> a computer an apartment</p> <p><i>The</i> is a definite article because it can be used with words beginning with consonant and vowel sounds. It can also be used with singular or plural nouns and adjectives. <u>Examples:</u> the company the companies</p> <p><i>The</i> is also used to refer to something with which both the writer and reader are familiar. <u>Example:</u> Remember <i>the</i> movie we went to see last night?</p> <p>Click here to practice definite/indefinite articles</p>	<p>People and companies create surveys to learn more about what groups think or believe.
