





Completed Advanced Leadership Course in June 2025







Tony Rushing, a 2012 Gateway STEM graduate, followed a unique path from higher education to urban farming. After earning multiple degrees—including a master's in Higher Education: Administration—he climbed the ranks in college admissions, eventually becoming a Director. But despite his success, Rushing chose a different life: one rooted in community, food access, and sustainability.

By day, he works at Raintree School, a forest school where he helps kids grow food in the Squirrel Garden. Outside of work, his passion comes to life through Tony TNT Gardening, a North St. Louis-based project that supplies fresh produce to his neighbors through the One Africa! One Nation! Farmers Market and weekly food giveaways. His backyard farm overflows with garlic, tomatoes, squash, sunflowers, and more.

Rushing's love of gardening started with his dad's tomato plants and has grown into something much larger. He credits nature for his success, keeping things simple with dirt, water, compost, and trust. He even prefers to give away basil as a plant so others can learn to grow themselves. Seasonal rotation keeps his beds thriving year-round with everything from cucumbers to kale.

Known for pulling up to the market on his motorcycle, Rushing brings a unique energy to the urban farming scene. "People don't think growing food is cool," he says, "so I make it cool." The market blends produce with live music, yoga, and community, and he's at the heart of it, changing perceptions about farming one conversation at a time.

Now, he's dreaming even bigger—planning to buy vacant lots for community gardens and build a nursery to serve his neighborhood. From college admissions to cultivating crops, Tony Rushing is still leading—just with soil under his nails instead of a suit on his back.
