Independent Reading Assignment Quarter 1 (Book Talk Persuasive Speech AND Book Review Written Assignment)

I. The Book Talk Persuasive Speech

The goal of the book talk is to "sell" your book to the rest of the class in five minutes by creating a convincing and logical argument. You want to encourage your classmates to read the book. In order to do this, you will have to present the book using a particular focus (a slant or angle—an "act/skit"—a focus on one aspect of the book while still giving a general overview of it). This is especially important because some of your classmates may be reading the same book. You will need to consider the following:

- 1. **presentation aid**—visual, audio, handouts, or some other creative aid to support your claims about the book
- 2. **time**—your speech should be about five minutes (points deducted for 30 seconds or more under or over)
- 3. **content**—do not give away too much of the story! Remember that you want to create interest so that others will want to read the book, too. Even if you didn't like the book, you have to make the audience think it was a spectacular read. Find a particular focus, such as one sub-plot, one character, or one relationship. Be thorough to show your understanding of the book—your audience should be convinced you read and understood the book.
- 4. **oral presentation**—do not read your speech! Speak loudly, clearly, and use language that is appropriate for the class. Do not rush, make eye contact, and don't just look at the teacher!
- 5. **preparedness**—practice your speech and have index cards or other aids to help you. After the presentation, expect to be asked questions about your book.
