

Introduction



- Reading plays a crucial role in early childhood development, shaping:
 - Language skills
 - Cognitive abilities
 - Social-emotional growth
- Challenges:
 - Not all families have access to resources
 - Lack of knowledge on engaging in reading activities at home
- Objective:
- Create a program that empowers parents to read with their children
- Provide necessary tools and incentives

- Program Components
- Book Selection & Cultural Relevance
 - Students choose books that reflect their culture and interests
- Parental Engagement
 - Teaching strategies:
 - Picture walks
 - Dialogic reading
 - PEER (Prompt, Evaluate, Expand, Repeat) & CAR (Comment, Ask, Respond) techniques
 - Wh questions (Who, What, Where, When, Why, How)
 - Recall techniques
 - Phonics models
- Video Recording
 - Parents record themselves reading to their child for at least 11 minutes daily
- Feedback & Support
 - Facilitators provide feedback and foster peer reviews

Compensation

Parents receive \$1 per minute of reading, totaling \$55 per week

- Duration: 10-week program
- Participation: Voluntary for all Pre-K families
- Parent Roles:
 - Priority Gatekeeper: Reinforce the importance of reading
 - Reading Role Model: Read daily using Dialogic Reading Techniques

Orientation Session:

Explain objectives, guidelines, and tools for documenting reading activities

Book Distribution:

 Students select diverse, age-appropriate books to build home libraries

Recognition & Rewards:

Weekly monetary incentives for meeting reading goals

Program Evaluation:

Parent surveys to assess impact and gather feedback





Outcomes



- Increased early literacy skills
- Strengthened family engagement in education
- Positive impact on children's cognitive and social-emotional development
- •Established reading habits that extend beyond the program
- Promote literacy skills
- •Foster family engagement
- Support both parents and students

Creating a culture of reading and learning for future generations
