OUR STUDENTS' COMMUNITY IMPACT

Here's a quick overview of a few of the things our amazing students have accomplished this semester:

- Collegiate Dance Marathon event raised over \$3,600 dollars for the Children's Miracle Network in St. Louis.
- Pie Day Friday, hosted by the Health and Occupational Science Association, raised over \$250 for the Children's Cancer Research Foundation. The funds were raised from students paying \$2 to throw a pie at their favorite teachers; that's a lot of pies!

Cross Country accomplishes a Collegiate-first by sending a full team to a state competition. The women's team qualified for state after placing 2nd in the district competition with an average time of 23:55 for the 5000 meter race. The men's team also did well at districts, placing 7th with an average time of 21:32. - Volley ball ends the season 12-8. The girls' varsity team finished 2nd overall in the district. This was a transitional season for the team after the loss of their

beloved coach, Ms. Lewis-Bey, who

passed away unexpectedly last summer.
